Welcome to TAGGS

The mission of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) is to enhance the health and well-being of Americans by providing for effective health and human services and by fostering sound, sustained advances in the sciences underlying medicine, public health, and social services. In support of its mission, HHS awards grants for more than 300 programs covering a wide spectrum of activities, which amounts to approximately 60% of the federal government's grant dollars. Tracking and accounting for HHS grant spending and providing high quality data to the public and external stakeholders is critical to fulfilling HHS's mission and strategic goals.

The Annual Report

This annual report reflects a summary of grants HHS awarded during Fiscal Year 2012 (October 1, 2011, through September 30, 2012). Grants are a legal instrument reflecting the relationship between the United States Government and a State, a local government, or other entity when

1. the principal purpose of the relationship is to transfer a thing of value to the State or local government or other recipient to carry out a public purpose of support or stimulation authorized by a law of the United States instead of acquiring (by purchase, lease, or barter) property or services for the direct benefit or use of the United States Government; and
2. substantial involvement is not expected between the executive agency and the State, local government, or other recipient when carrying out the activity contemplated in the agreement (31 U.S.C. §6304).

This report does not include information related to technical assistance, which provides services instead of money; other assistance in the form of loans, loan guarantees, interest subsidies, or insurance; direct payments of any kind to individuals; or contracts, which are required to be entered into and administered under procurement laws and regulations.

Grant Highlights

- HHS awarded approximately \$347 billion in grants.
- The 6 states receiving the highest amount of HHS grant funds were California, New York, Texas, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Florida.
- 86% of HHS grant funds were allocated to Formula/Block & Entitlement grants.
- HHS awarded over \$3 billion in Recovery Act grant dollars. The majority of these funds were awarded to States.
- Universities and colleges represented 42 of the top 50 HHS discretionary grant recipients.

Portfolio News and Highlights

Administration for Community Living (ACL) - The creation of the new Administration for Community Living (ACL) was announced in April 2012. The ACL will pursue improved opportunities for older Americans and people with disabilities to enjoy the fullest inclusion in the life of our nation.

ACL includes the efforts and achievements of the Administration on Aging, the Office on Disability and the Administration on Developmental Disabilities in a single agency, with enhanced policy and program support for both cross-cutting initiatives and efforts focused on the unique needs of individual groups such as children with developmental disabilities, adults with physical disabilities, or seniors, including seniors with Alzheimer's.

Office of Rural Health Policy (ORHP) - HHS celebrated 25 years for the Office of Rural Health Policy. Created in 1987 under the Social Security Act, ORHP advises the Secretary on HHS policies impacting rural health and works with state and local partners to enhance delivery of services to 62 million residents living in rural communities.

Housed within the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), ORHP provides grants to 50 State Offices of Rural Health and community-based programs, and provides technical assistance to small rural hospitals.

Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) - July 30, 2012 marked the 47th anniversary of the signing of Medicare and Medicaid into law, a promise we made to older Americans and the most vulnerable of our citizens that they will have the medical care they need to live healthier lives.

For our elderly, the pledge reflects the acknowledgement that after contributing a lifetime to our nation's well-being, our seniors deserve to be able to live out their years with the security and peace of mind that comes with having affordable health insurance under Medicare. For low income children, parents and people with disabilities, Medicaid created a federal-state partnership to provide a secure health care safety net to promote stronger families and communities across our country.

Funding Opportunities Highlights

Elder Abuse Prevention Interventions Program - A \$5.5 million funding opportunity was announced on June 14, 2012 for states and tribes to test ways to prevent elder abuse, neglect and exploitation. This initiative helps to implement the Elder Justice Act, which was enacted as part of the Affordable Care Act. The initiatives funded through this announcement will test approaches designed to prevent elder abuse, neglect, or exploitation and build knowledge of risk factors related to these events.

Consumer Assistance Programs (CAP) - A new round of funding to support state-based Consumer Assistance Programs that help consumers who have questions or concerns regarding their health insurance was announced on June 7, 2012. Consumer Assistance Program (CAP) grantees, which can be state agencies or local non-profits contracted by a state, provide a wide variety of services for consumers. They can help consumers find health coverage and file appeals against health plans. For individuals unsure about their rights, Consumer Assistance Programs can educate them to take action.

Aging and Disability Resource Center Program (ADRC) – On May 31, 2012 a new \$25 million funding opportunity was announced made possible by the Affordable Care Act to help states strengthen and expand their ability to help seniors and people with disabilities access home and community-based long-term services and supports. The initiative, known as the Aging and Disability Resource Center Program, was established through a partnership between the Administration for Community Living (ACL), the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), and the Department of Veterans Affairs' Veterans Health Administration (VHA).

Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) – On January 19, 2012 HHS released more than \$863 million to grantees to help low-income households with their heating and other home energy costs under the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). HHS is releasing the remaining funds, made available by the Consolidated Appropriation Act, 2012 (Public Law 112-74), to states, territories, tribes and the District of Columbia.

The \$863 million in regular block grant funds released is in addition to the \$2.6 billion released since October 2011. Including funds released in 2012, grantees will receive a total of \$3.4 billion in LIHEAP block funds for Fiscal Year 2012.

Tracking Accountability in Government Grants System (TAGGS)

The Tracking Accountability in Government Grants System (TAGGS) is a robust reporting tool developed by the Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) Office of Grants and Acquisition Policy and Accountability (OGAPA) in 1995. The TAGGS database is a central repository for grants awarded by the HHS Operating Divisions (OPDIVs), Staff Divisions (STAFFDIVs), and the Office of the Secretary (OS). In addition to award data that is submitted twice a week by the OPDIVs, TAGGS also receives recipients' demographic information, payment data from the Payment Management System (PMS), and the grant program description information from the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) website.

HHS remains committed to increasing transparency of Federal funds and showing the public where and how their money is spent. Through the TAGGS public website (hhs.taggs.gov) HHS staff, congressional offices, other executive agencies, potential and current grant recipients, and other interested parties access the site for a variety of informational purposes. Commonly searched data fields include: congressional district, program name, recipient name, recipient location, awarding OPDIV, transaction amount and fiscal year.

The annual report data reflects award transactions made during Fiscal Year (FY) 2012, and may not exactly correspond to the HHS FY 2012 budget and accounting records based on the following assumptions:

1. Award data may include de-obligations of prior years in addition to current year funds;
2. Costs of personnel in lieu of cash are recorded as personnel costs in accounting records; and
3. Joint agency programs are only recorded if they originated at HHS.

The dollar amounts set forth in this report for each OPDIV may also differ from the amounts shown in each OPDIV's Budget Request. Percentages used throughout the report may not add up to exactly 100% due to rounding and other minor adjustments.



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

HHS 2012 Organization

HHS is comprised of Operating Divisions (OPDIVs) and Staff Divisions (STAFFDIVs), each with its own unique mission. The organization chart below presents the overall structure of HHS during FY 2012. The OPDIVs/STAFFDIVs are responsible for administering and managing approximately 450 grant programs which are described in the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA).

Note that in this report, Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry awards are included in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention grant funding data.



Formula/Block & Entitlement, Discretionary Grants and Cooperative Agreements

In FY 2012 the Department of Health and Human Services awarded approximately 60% of the federal government’s grant dollars. HHS awards formula/block, entitlement, discretionary grant awards and cooperative agreements.

Title 45 CFR Part 74 defines discretionary grants as **those that permit the federal government, according to specific authorizing legislation, to exercise judgment, or “discretion” in selecting the applicant/recipient organization, through a competitive grant process.”**

Formula/block grants and entitlement programs are those that a federal agency is required by statute to award, subject to availability of an appropriation, if the recipient, usually a state, submits an acceptable state plan or application, and meets the eligibility and compliance requirements of the statutory and regulatory provisions of the grant program.

The Federal Grant and Cooperative Agreement Act of 1977, 31 U.S.C. 6301, defines the cooperative agreement as an alternative assistance instrument to be used in lieu of a grant whenever substantial Federal involvement with the recipient during performance is anticipated. The difference between grants and cooperative agreements is the degree of Federal programmatic involvement rather than the type of administrative requirements imposed. Therefore, information contained in this report that is applicable to grants, also applies to cooperative agreements, unless the award itself provides otherwise.

Medicaid, State Children’s Health Insurance Program (SCHIP), and Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) are large HHS formula/block and entitlement programs, providing support for health care and human services to millions of Americans.


Medicare, the nation’s largest health insurance program, is a direct payment program and its funding levels are not included in the TAGGS CMS grant totals. Examples of key CMS grant programs include the Medicare State Survey and Certification Group; CMS Research, Demonstrations and Evaluations; Medicare Hospital Insurance; and Medicare Supplementary Medical Insurance. TAGGS does not track direct payments to individuals thus direct payments are not included in the annual report.

As of September 2012, HHS awarded approximately \$347 billion in grants for FY 2012. This included \$46 billion in discretionary awards and \$329 billion in formula/block and entitlement awards.

CMS, which administers the Medicaid Program, awarded 76% (\$293 billion) of the total HHS grant funds. However, these awards only represented about 2% of the total number of grants awarded by HHS.



ACF had the second highest percentage of total HHS grant funds awarded at 13% or \$49 billion. This represented about 10% of the total number of grants awarded. NIH, which awarded 6% or \$22 billion of the total HHS grant funds, accounted for 67% of the total number of HHS grants.

The following charts show HHS award history and the total grant awards and dollars for each OPDIV for FY 2012.




The two pie charts on this page contrast OPDIVs that spent the largest amount of grant funds in FY 2012 against those OPDIVs awarding the largest number of grant awards. Please note that the grant dollars and number of awards by the remaining grant-making OPDIVs at HHS are not reflected due to the small percentages that they encompass for display.

As illustrated, CMS far exceeded all other OPDIVs in terms of grant dollars spent. In contrast, NIH had the lion's share of the number of grants awarded in FY 2012, followed by ACF and HRSA.

Treemap

A treemap is a chart that compares FY 2012 and FY 2011 non-discretionary grant program awards by Grantee Type, Grantee Class and Award activity, and displays grant information in several ways. It shows the number of dollars awarded for a type of grant in a fiscal year, the proportion of dollar awards for the type of grant in the current fiscal year, and how much the award dollar value changed from the previous fiscal year.

Closed-ended entitlement program - A type of non-discretionary grant program where the award amount constitutes an upper limit on the amount of funds the federal government may pay for allowable programmatic activities.

Open-ended entitlement program - A type of non-discretionary grant program where, based on compliance with programmatic requirements, e.g., provision of specified services to eligible beneficiaries, the OPDIV is required to reimburse the recipient (generally a state) for all or a portion of eligible costs and there is no upper limit on the amount of funds the federal government will pay for allowable services and activities (as specified in the governing statute and implementing regulations).

The online version of this Annual Report uses various interactive charts to show these award comparisons. The data contained in these charts are substantial and best viewed in tables online.


Discretionary Award Types

In accordance with HHS regulation 45CFR Part 74, HHS defines “discretionary” grants as an award made by an HHS awarding agency in keeping with specific statutory authority which enables the agency to exercise judgment (“discretion”) in selecting the applicant/recipient organization through a competitive award process.

Discretionary grants commonly support activities such as demonstration, research, training, service, and construction projects or programs. Discretionary grants are sometimes referred to by the CFDA term “Project Grants.”

Based on the HHS mission, grant program descriptions, and the CFDA guidelines, the TAGGS system uses 16 activity types to characterize the nature of the grant being funded. For the purpose of this report, these 16 have been grouped into four major activity types (Research, Services, Training, and Other). HHS OPDIVs self-select the activity type for awards based on the primary purpose of the grant.

The chart below shows the number of awards and award dollars that HHS agencies granted organized by the four Major Activity Types – Research, Services, Training, and Other. The chart contains rings, with summary data shown at the center.

The data displayed in the following charts reflect awards classified by OPDIVs as research, service, training, or other activities. Program names generated by the OPDIVs may not encompass all activities carried out under the CFDA program. 


"Other" programs include construction projects; grants for the planning and development of health programs and health resources; evaluations; and health infrastructure awards.




Discretionary Awards By U.S. Location





ACF Total Award Amount









CDC Total Award Amount





The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) administers the Medicare program and works in partnership with states to administer Medicaid and the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP). About one in four Americans receives health coverage.

Medicare, the nation's largest health insurance program, is a direct payment program and its funding levels are not included in the CMS grant totals. Grant programs which support the administration of some Medicare services are included in CMS totals. Examples of key CMS grant programs include the Medicare State Survey and Certification Group; CMS Research, Demonstrations and Evaluations; Medicare Hospital Insurance; and Medicare Supplementary Medical Insurance.





CMS Total Award Amount




CMS Total Number of Awards





FDA: Total Award Amounts and Award Number



FDA Total Award Amount




FDA Total Number of Awards




The IHS goal is to ensure that comprehensive, culturally acceptable personal and public health services are available and accessible to all American Indian and Alaska Native people. The foundation of IHS is to uphold the federal government obligation to promote healthy American Indian and Alaska Native people, communities, and cultures and to honor and protect the inherent sovereign rights of tribes.

IHS awarded over \$1.8 billion in comprehensive health services to American Indian and Alaska Native people.


The IHS manages Discretionary and “Compact” awards. Compacts are written agreements consistent with the federal government’s trust responsibility, treaty obligations, and the government-to-government relationship between Indian tribes and the United States and may only be amended by mutual agreement of the parties. Compacts are usually awarded with an “indefinite term” per the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance under Title V of the statute and therefore intended to be in place in perpetuity. Funding Agreements associated with Title V compacts identify the Programs, Functions, Services, and Activities (PFSAs) or portions thereof that will be assumed by a tribe or tribal organization and the funding that is related to those PFSAs. Each tribe has a sole right to its share of IHS PFSAs. Each tribe chooses whether to receive the funding and each tribe controls the timing of the funding agreement and the retention of the ongoing responsibility for so long as permitted by federal law or until terminated by mutual written agreement, retrocession, or resumption.



IHS Total Award Amount
















